3rd Congressional District Convention in La Crosse!

The Democratic Party of Wisconsin 3rd Congressional District Convention (3rd CD) will be held on May 4, 2019, at the Lunda Center, Western Technical College, in La Crosse. Registration is from 9:00 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. with the call to order promptly at 10:00 a.m.

La Crosse is allotted 61 delegates to the 3rd CD and State and conventions. As of April 1, thirty LCDP members have notified the LCDP chair of their intent to be a delegate. This does not include the five auto-delegates of our elected officials and the LCDP chair. A candidate for delegate or alternate must be a party member at least 14 days before the opening of the convention. For the 3rd CD Convention that date is Friday, April 19, 2019.

Thirty-one delegate slots remain. If you are interested in being a delegate, please contact <u>chair@</u> <u>lax.dems</u> or leave a message at 608-769-5286 or 608-784-4219 by Thursday, April 11, 2019. Delegates to the 3rd CD Convention are automatically delegates to the DPW State Convention at the Potawatomi Hotel and Casino in Milwaukee on Saturday, June 1 & Sunday, June 2, 2019.

Restore tax fairness to middle class

Wisconsin families are working harder than ever. But many are finding that no matter how much they sacrifice or how many hours they put in, they live every day on the verge of economic and financial insecurity.

The burden of rising student loan debt, the outsourcing of jobs and the ever-increasing costs of health insurance and child care are making it difficult for families to get ahead.

Despite these challenges, we know a path to success, and we don't have to look far for solutions.

It starts with restoring tax fairness for the middle class, closing tax loopholes for the wealthy and eliminating tax breaks for corporations that lay off workers and ship jobs out of state.

Gov. Tony Evers has made it clear that his state budget will include real tax relief for hardworking families by rolling back Republican tax giveaways to millionaires and corporations.

At a time when infant care costs more than tuition at a University of Wisconsin school, Republicans continue to defend tax giveaways for corporations that don't pay a single dollar in income taxes.

Think about that for a second: Corporations can claim a tax credit that isn't tied to job creation, and they pay nothing in income taxes. These are the same corporations that rely on Wisconsin's workforce, roads, hospitals and community services. Yet this credit lets them avoid their fair share of investments in our state.

Another loophole that has plagued municipalities of all sizes across the state is the dark-store loophole. This loophole allows large corporate retailers to shift their tax liability onto Main Street businesses and local homeowners. It's one of the reasons we saw a jump in property taxes last year.

Gov. Evers has vowed to close this loophole in his budget and prioritize tax fairness for seniors and working families.

Our economy works best when we level the playing field, strengthen communities, support local businesses and expand economic opportunities.

As we seek to build a brighter future for everyone in our state, Democrats are focused on the important issues at hand: sustainable tax relief for working families, seniors, smallbusiness owners and family farms.

It's refreshing to be in a new era with a governor who is listening to the people and working to make our state a place where the next generation wants to live, work and raise a family.

What Is the Green New Deal? A Climate Proposal, Explained

What is the Green New Deal?

The Green New Deal is a [nonbinding] congressional resolution that lays out a grand plan for tackling climate change. ... [T]he proposal calls on the federal government to wean the United States from fossil fuels and curb planetwarming greenhouse gas emissions across the economy. It also aims to guarantee new high-paying jobs in clean energy industries.

Will there be a vote on it?

Yes.

What problem is the Green New Deal addressing?

The goal of the Green New Deal is to reduce greenhouse gas emissions in order to avoid the worst consequences of climate change while also trying to fix societal problems like economic inequality and racial injustice.

The resolution uses as its guide two major reports issued last year by the United Nations and by federal scientists who warned that if global temperatures continue to rise, the world is headed for more intense heat waves, wildfires and droughts.

The research shows that the United States economy could lose billions of dollars by the end of the century because of climate change. Currently, carbon emissions are rising, by 3.4 percent last year in the United States and by 2.7 percent globally, according to early estimates.

Supporters of the Green New Deal also believe that change can't just be a technological feat, and say it must also tackle poverty, income inequality and racial discrimination.

What are its main provisions?

[H]ere, but here are the essential elements: ... the entire world needs to get to net-zero emissions by 2050 — meaning as much carbon would have to be absorbed as released into the atmosphere — and the United States must take a "leading role" in achieving that.

The Green New Deal calls on the federal government to dramatically reduce greenhouse gas emissions, create highpaying jobs, ensure that clean air, clean water and healthy food are basic human rights, and end all forms of oppression.

To achieve those goals, the plan calls for the launch of a "10-year mobilization" to reduce carbon emissions in the United States. It envisions sourcing 100 percent of the country's electricity from renewable and zero-emissions power, digitizing the nation's power grid, upgrading every building in the country to be more energy-efficient, and overhauling the nation's transportation system by investing in electric vehicles and high-speed rail.

To address social justice, the resolution says it is the duty of the government to provide job training and new economic development, particularly to communities that currently rely on jobs in fossil fuel industries.

What doesn't it say?

Senator Tom Cotton of Arkansas has said the deal would force Americans to have to "ride around on high-speed light rail, supposedly powered by unicorn tears." President Trump has claimed the Green New Deal will take away your "airplane rights." ... And Senator John Barrasso, Republican of Wyoming and chairman of the Committee on Environment and Public Works, warned that ice cream, cheeseburgers and milkshakes would be a thing of the past because under the Green New Deal, "livestock will be banned."

The resolution doesn't do any of those things....The resolution does call on the federal government to make investments in policies and projects that would eventually change the way we design buildings, travel and eat. For example: cows. To reduce methane, a powerful greenhouse gas that cows and other livestock emit, the resolution proposes "working collaboratively with farmers and ranchers in the United States to eliminate pollution and greenhouse gas emissions from the agricultural sector as much as is technologically feasible."

What's with the name?

The Green New Deal takes its name and inspiration from the major government makeover, known as the New Deal, launched by President Franklin D. Roosevelt to help the United States recover from the Great Depression. ...Like the original New Deal, the Green New Deal is not a single project or piece of legislation.

What are the costs?

That's not clear yet....For now it's impossible to pin down dollar figures on the plan. ... Converting the country to 100 percent clean power? In Vermont alone, which has a goal of achieving 90 percent renewable energy by midcentury, the cost is estimated at \$33 billion. Yet the state is seeing job growth in clean energy sectors and expects the transition will spur cost savings for consumers.

Modernizing the electrical grid across the United States could cost as much as \$476 billion, yet reap \$2 trillion in benefits, according to a 2011 study issued by the Electric Power Research Institute....

Do critics offer alternative proposals?

Some Republicans have called for a technology-oriented solution to climate change, but so far no critic has come out with an alternative that matches the scale or scope of the Green New Deal.

How will the Green New Deal shape the debate?

There is going to be a lot more political jockeying around the Green New Deal in coming weeks and months. Republicans have already launched video ads trying to tie Democrats to the proposal, which they have described as "radical."... At the same time, all of the attention on the Green New Deal has put new pressure on Republican critics to come up with their own plan for cutting greenhouse gases.
